When I learned about the terrible conditions people were living in at the Okeechobee and Osceola Centers in Belle Glade, I took immediate action that ushered forth significant improvements. And once again, when I learned this week of potential life-safety code violations at an apartment complex in the Glades area and saw pictures that would make anyone's stomach churn, I immediately arranged a visit to the property with County Administration, Code Enforcement, Community Services, and the Solid Waste Authority. I am going to do everything I can to help these families who are living in a property that has fallen into egregious disrepair. No one--especially young children-should ever have to live in the horrific unsafe and unsanitary conditions I witnessed there.

#### Palm Beach County First in Florida to Approve Cancer Presumption Language for Firefighters

On February 5, Palm Beach County Commissioner Melissa McKinlay, along with her fellow County Commissioners, approved a new collective bargaining agreement with the Professional Firefighters/Paramedics of Palm Beach County, Local 2928, IAFF, Inc. Included in this agreement is cancer presumption language that entitles firefighters to on-the-job disability and supplemental long term disability benefits if they are diagnosed with cancer during the performance of their regular duties.

Palm Beach County is the first county in Florida to approve cancer presumption language for firefighters. With the Florida Legislature consistently failing to pass similar legislation in recent years, Commissioner McKinlay pushed to include this language so Palm Beach County could lead by example.

"Firefighters perform one of the most important, yet dangerous, jobs in our society. I'm thankful that Palm Beach County is taking the lead in Florida by recognizing the risks of carcinogenic exposure that these brave men and women face during their careers," Commissioner McKinlay said. "Firefighters spend their careers putting their lives on the line for us, so Palm Beach County's approval of this contract sends a strong message that we will stand with them when they need it most. I hope it encourages the Legislature to finally pass essential legislation to protect firefighters across the state."

A growing body of research and data shows how cancer impacts the firefighting profession. According to the International Association of Firefighters (IAFF), cancer is the leading cause of death among firefighters. From January 1, 2002 to March 31, 2017, the IAFF reports that 61% of career firefighter line-of-duty deaths were caused by cancer. Research from the Centers for Disease Control and The National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health shows that firefighters in the United States face a 9% higher risk of being diagnosed with cancer, and a 14% higher risk of dying from cancer, than the general population.

The Alyssa Sangeeta Jacobson Scholarship is dedicated to those who need a little extra assistance in achieving educational goals. The scholarship provides \$1,000 per year, distributed over two semesters to each recipient, and is renewable for up to four years, depending on the degree or certificate program.

The scholarship is open to graduating high school seniors and high school graduates who will attend an accredited college or technical vocational school beginning in Fall 2022. Currently enrolled college, technical, or vocational students are also encouraged to apply. Enhanced consideration will be given to applicants who are members of Future Leaders United for Change or involved in the dependency or delinquency systems.

# PBC Cooperative Extension to Offer Workshop for First-Time Homebuyers

Are you thinking about purchasing a home? Learn about the steps to homeownership and how to obtain an affordable mortgage in Palm Beach County (PBC) by attending the University of Florida/Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences (UF/IFAS) Extension First-Time Home Buyer workshop. The class is provided by the Palm Beach County Cooperative Extension, a local agency approved by Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

The course is HUD-approved and is an 8-hour, pre-purchase, homebuyer workshop that meets the homebuyer education requirement for workforce housing and down payment assistance programs. Participants must attend two 4-hour sessions or one 8-hour session for successful completion of the 8-hour program.

Classes are \$10 per individual/couple. A scholarship is available to those who qualify. The sessions are offered online via Zoom in English and Spanish.

# Press Release! Housing Rehabilitation Assistance

Palm Beach County's Department of Housing and Economic Development (HED) has announced the availability of American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) Owner Occupied Housing Rehabilitation assistance funds for Fiscal Year 2021-2022.

Funding will assist income eligible homeowners, residing in the **unincorporated area of Palm Beach County**, with substantial rehabilitation to correct code violations or items that will soon become a code violation. Properties MUST be located within a federally designated Qualified Census Tract (QCT). Properties located outside of a QCT, may not be eligible to apply for assistance. **NOTE:** Applicant must provide a statement on how their household was financially impacted by COVID. **PROPERTY'S ASSESSED VALUE CANNOT EXCEED \$352,371.** 

ARPA Owner Occupied Housing Rehabilitation Program applications will be available online by visiting the website at <a href="https://pbcgov.com/HED">https://pbcgov.com/HED</a> beginning Monday, January 24, 2021 at 8:00am – Monday, February 28, 2022 at 11:59pm (or until 90 applications

have been submitted). Applications will be processed on a first submitted, first qualified, first served basis, subject to funding availability. **NOTE:** Additional program information and required documents needed for application submittal are available on the website at pbcgov.com/HED.

**ADDITIONAL INFORMATION:** ALL applicants are required to attend a Virtual Mandatory Orientation prior to application submittal.
