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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE YOUR VOTE BY MAIL HAS EXPIRED!



All **Vote-By-Mail** (VBM) applications for all voters in Florida have expired. Now is the time to reapply, as municipal elections will be conducted March 14 for 17 municipalities. **Vote-By-Mail** requests must be received by the Supervisor of Elections (SOE) by March 4, 2023, if a ballot is to be mailed. After that date, you can go to the SOE, fill out an application, and pick up your ballot — through March 13. **Your ballot must be in by March 14 to be counted**. (Postmarks don't count.)

Although the VBM ballot envelope is postage paid, you should allow two weeks for delivery. You can drop off your ballot at the four SOE offices. There is no early voting in municipal elections. If voting in person, bring an appropriate ID.

To request a **Vote-By-Mail** ballot you must first be a registered voter in Florida. (Feb. 13 is the last day to register to vote in the March 14 election.) There are four ways to request a **Vote-By-Mail** ballot from the Supervisor of Elections office:






YOU CAN HELP DRESS FOR SUCCESS CLIENTS AT TODAY'S HOT TOPIC LUNCHEON

EDUCATED OPINIONS ON SCHOOL CHOICE

The League of Women Voters of Florida's positions on education includes promoting "adequate and equitable funding of public education and oppose use of public funding for the expansion of funding of private education, including through voucher program."

Universal Voucher Program Under HB 1 Would Cost Billions, Analysis Finds

Funding for public school districts would drop by over \$900 per pupil if the Florida House's voucher expansion bill was enacted

TAMPA, Fla. — Legislation (HB 1) that would implement a massive expansion of Florida's voucher program by broadening eligibility to include all K-12 students in the state would redirect billions in state school aid from public to private schools, according to an <u>analysis</u> by Florida Policy Institute (FPI) and Education Law Center (ELC).

High-income families, current private school students, and homeschooled students would be newly eligible for vouchers under the proposed law. Even under conservative estimates, Florida Empowerment Scholarship (FES) vouchers would cost the state about \$4 billion dollars in the initial year of HB-1 implementation. This does not include costs for the proposed expansion of the Florida tax credit scholarship vouchers (\$568 million in 2021-22).

Florida could soon have two separate and unequal school systems.

One would be regulated by strict state laws on curriculum, testing, student performance, school grades, safety and even on how teachers can discuss race, gender and sexual orientation.

The other gets to slide by under the motto: "The fewer regulations, the better." Those schools don't have to be accredited by an outside organization, teachers don't have to be certified and curriculum requirements are lax. If those schools ignore evolution to teach creationism, it's not the state's business, yet taxpayers are still paying for them.

women's suffrage movement. She will explore both domestic and political views of the topic as found through vintage postcards, the social media of the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

WE HELPED SHINE A LIGHT ON ACA ENROLLMENT

According to CMS.gov, approximately 16 million people have signed up for Affordable Health Coverage in the ACA Marketplaces during the 2022 Open Enrollment period (Nov. 1, 2022 to Jan. 15, 2023). This record-breaking enrollment represents a 13 percent increase over the previous year, including more than 3 million people new to the Marketplaces.

As of Jan. 7, Florida's total enrollment figure was 3,151,448. In Palm Beach County, our LWVPBC Healthcare Team (along with other LWVPBC committees and our other local partners) distributed approximately 1,400 copies of the flyer, in three languages. Many of these same groups and individuals also posted the flyers on social media.


