Our flexibility must also stay within the boundaries of our values and do what we know to be the right thing. And it's often smart to compromise.

For example, your mother doesn't want to get up to do her exercises and help her recover. Your solution may be to allow her to stay in bed a little while longer but then give her a time when she must exercise. You explain to her that you want her to get better and that she must do her exercises in order to do that.

You exhibit flexibility with her in terms of the time, but you also stay within your values of making sure you are doing your part to help her recover.
